



EDITORIAL

At a time when genuine and sustainable tourism is increasingly in demand, Aube in Champagne possesses and cultivates a number of natural assets.

Its expanses of preserved forests, large lakes, vast plains, vineyard-covered hill-sides, and rivers like the Aube, the Seine, and its tributaries, are located in proximity to the Paris basin and at the crossroads of motorways running from the south to the north of France, from the United Kingdom, or from Belgium to Italy. Its cycling routes allow visitors to discover the territory in communion with nature. Its amusement park, Nigloland, includes nearly 100 acres where families can enjoy quality time together walking along paths lined with flowers and trees.

Far from experiencing just the immediate surroundings, visitors are also invited to dive into the history of the Champagne region. Proud of its roots, the territory and its inhabitants work year-round to share their heritage..

We work with Champagne winegrowers heavily involved in wine tourism, who welcome you to their cellars to share with you their special knowledge of harvesting and wine-making in the Champagne area. You are also invited to join them during the key periods of the vineyard: from the grape harvest at the end of

the summer to the tasting of their vintages during the Champagne Trail Festival.

Several new museums and residences pay homage to the great men and women of the department. Accordingly, after the opening

of the Camille Claudel museum in Nogent, the house of Renoir in Essoyes, and the synagogue of Rashi in Troyes, the town of Brienne now pays homage to a man who once endured the military academy there: Napoleon Bonaparte. The Museum opened its doors in January 2018 and will be the first to bear witness to the intimacy of the great man.

One of the greatest archaeological discoveries of recent years in France, the treasure of the Celtic Prince Lavau, discovered in 2014, will be exhibited for the first time in Troyes, starting in May.

What would this heritage be without the life breathed into it by the 200 Aube volunteers? They put a lot into supporting our visitors. For 5 years, thanks to associations gathered around organisms that support tourism (departmental and pastoral Tourism Committee), these enthusiasts of the history of churches, stained glass, statuary works, Templars, Champagne, fauna and flora... offer tours, whatever your interest, to share their passion, guided by the history of the territory and the men and women who have shaped it. This level of engagement is remarkable and the development of public

loyalty increases its success each year.

The first Department in the Grand Est to engage in the 'Green Passport' initiative under the aegis of the United Nations Environment Program, the Aube emphasizes

respect for life through a sustainable and innovative approach. The launching of the Slow Tourism Lab, the 1st incubator dedicated to rural tourism, which engages business owners from the Aube region as well as the rest of the nation, is a perfect example of this approach.

And finally, the business traveller has not been for-

gotten, for the professional networks he will find will add value to his visit, so he too can benefit from local know-how.

Our strength is our ability to tell our story, to offer authenticity to tourists respectful and curious about our territory. A tourism marked by values and seduced by the diversity of its riches, which makes any visit exceptional, and with the human touch of the professional or volunteer.

These moments of human interaction are essential to understanding our true history, our heritage, and perhaps even a part of your own roots!

How to get here

- By road: The territory is located at the intersection of motorways A5 and A26 and at the crossroads of major European roadways;
- By rail: Aube is easily reached via the SNCF line from PARIS to Belfort Mulhouse. Paris to Troyes takes about 1h30!
- By air: The destination has no fewer than two airports: the Troyes business airport in Champagne (10 minutes) and the Paris-Vatry business airport (30 min) as well as, of course, Paris-Orly and Paris-CDG international airports, which put the destination at 1h30 from the capital.

In short, at only 90 minutes from Paris, 3h30 from Lyon, and 4h from Strasbourg or Brussels, Aube in Champagne is an easily accessible department located in the heart of the Grand Est region. All facilities are in the vicinity of points of interest.



NAPOLEON

Opening of the new Napoleon Museum in Brienne-le-Château

The Napoleon Museum, classified as a historical monument in 1933, is installed in the only

remaining building of the old royal military academy of Brienne-le-Château. The museum recounts in detail Bonaparte's youth and the France campaign of 1814. It was in 1779 that the young Napoleon Bonaparte entered the military academy of Brienne. He kept a nostalgic memory of this small town dear to his heart



To discover at the Napoleon Museum from 26 January 2018

Today, after 47 years of existence, the museum has had a fresh makeover. With an enlarged exhibit space, modern tools of mediation, an innovative museography, and ambitious programming, the museum is positioned as a major asset to enhance the local tourism offering. Different facets of Napoleon Bonaparte will be presented in the museum. Visitors will also discover a scenographic path constructed around four axes:

To make a mark, cut a figure

The 1st sequence highlights the garment most responsible for making Napoleon recognizable by everyone: the bicorne. Masterpiece of the Napoleon museum's collection, the bicorne is suspended in a glass showcase so every angle can be fully appreciated. Surrounding the famous hat, various busts and statutes reflect the attitudes of Napoleon's character. Other aspects of his image such as the hand in the vest and the frock coat feature in a film showing the evolution of Napoleon's bearing during the course his life. Using a Touch Terminal, visitors can learn how Napoleon's image was constructed.

Directing the military: Tactician and Strategist

The 2nd Sequence addresses the best-known aspect of Napoleonic history, directing the military. Recognized as an excellent tactician and strategist, Napoleon participated in numerous

battles and developed many strategies. With the help of two multimedia devices, visitors can trace the path and movement of each troupe during these battles. Lastly, a point of attachment to the territory with the French Campaign of 1814, fought in large part in Champagne and in particular the Aube. The department

was the theatre for many decisive conflicts, including the following events: Brienne-le-Château on 29 January, La Rothière on 1 February, Nogent-sur-Seine on 11 February, and Arcis-on-Aube on 20 and 21 March.

The reformer, Napoléon and institutions

Thanks to wood panelling dating from the Royal Military School (18th century) and the fireplace restored during the renovation, this room addresses reforms often forgotten or little-known. Established under Napoleon, they are many, involving aspects of daily life in the nineteenth century yet still valid today. A French Civil Code or Code Napoleon First Edition Year XII (1804)

in quarto paperback, is highlighted in a showcase. It is certainly the most well known reform established under Napoleon. Around the room, three filmed sequences tell the story of three institutions: the Civil Code, the cadastre with explanations by Jean Tulard, and the baccalaureate. A feuilletoir prepared at the centre of the room addresses others: for example the canals, the Code of Commerce, and the Bank of France.

A man, some men, Napoleon in private

In the final sequence, a relatively little known facet of Napoleon is evoked: Napoleon in private His link to Brienne-le-Château dominates this space, which focuses on the 5 years he spent at the Royal Military School. His cost records, and various depictions of the famous snowball fight, are some of the core items that help us understand Napoleon's character. Links with his family, his childhood, and his weddings are also on display. This sequence also addresses the end of Napoleon's life, his first exile in Saint Helena on the island of Elba, and his death, by way of Waterloo. The visit closes not with the death of Napoleon but with the Memorial of Saint Helena where Napoleon spoke of his past life, put in writing by Las Cases.



When HISTORY AND GASTRONOMY collide...

The Nicolo & Paradis House of Champagne is located in a manor loaded with history. Constructed in the 19th century by General Vouillemont, one of Napoleon's generals and Baron of the Empire, the estate then passed into the hands of the Bishop of Langres. Lovers of stone, champagne and tradition, David and Agnes welcome tourists in a cosy atmosphere around their traditional fireplace, to let them taste their most beautiful vintages.

ArkéAube Exhibition: From the first peasants to the Prince of Lavau (5300 BCE / 450 BCE)

In 2014 a team of archaeologists uncovered a princely tomb in Lavau, in the Aube, dating from the beginning of the 5th century before the current era. This Celtic treasure is reminiscent of the Vix Krater discovered in Burgundy, a little more to the South, in 1953.

To highlight this exceptional inheritance, the Aube is hosting an exhibition featuring this Treasure of Lavau and, more broadly, the archaeological wealth of the entire department.

From 5 May to 31 December 2018 at the Hôtel Dieu-le-Comte - Troyes

This exhibition tells the story of the men who populated the Aube and the relationships they maintained with the territory and neighbouring and distant populations 10,000 years ago, before the first settlements, up until the "princely

phenomenon" of the 5th century before the current era.

A flat land located on migratory and trade routes, the Aube captured all of these movements, from the broad Turkish plateaus to the Atlantic coast, from the Baltic countries to the Mediterranean.

More than 150 remarkable objects discovered mainly during preventive excavations will be presented, highlighting themes such as the organization of a Neolithic village, the symbolism of graves as a result of migration and trade, and the flourishing economy, especially with regard to rivers, merchants, craftsmen and warriors.

The climax will be the presentation to the public for the first time of the Treasure of Lavau. This excavation quite unexpectedly revealed the rich burial place of a man who lived in the 5th century before the current era. It brings together unique masterpieces: torque necklaces, gold bracelet, Greek oenochoe,.... This unspoiled Chieftain's Grave is one of the most recent and striking examples of the "princely" graves of

the Iron Age and is at the moment unrivalled in its splendour. The high point of the archaic period will also be presented in this exhibition.

Going further

In Troyes (and in Sens) 19 May to 29 October Museum of Fine Arts and Archaeology

This exhibition, held simultaneously in both Sens and Troyes, will highlight the richness and diversity of discoveries made throughout this vast region. It will lead visitors along the footsteps of a civilization that we think we know but which, in reality, is only gradually revealed to us through archaeological excavations and a critical review of antique literary sources. It will help us better understand who "our ancestors the Gauls" were in general, and the Sénons in particular. The Sénon Territory extended mainly from Melun to Auxerre and Étampes / Montarqis to Troyes.

In Châtillon-sur-Seine

All year long

At the Musée du Pays Châtillonnais where the Vix Treasure is housed you can marvel at the reconstituted princely tomb of The Lady of Vix and the imposing 1m64 high Vix Krater.



The Templars of the Aube

The Aube is a territory called to arms to (re)live its history. Actors of the Department, the cradle of the Templars, are diversifying their offer by proposing an immersion into the mythical order of the Temple.

Visit to the Commandery of Avalleur:

José, Jean, Alain, Claudine and Yolande welcome you to the Commandery of Avalleur as it was in the time of Hugues de Payns. In white robes, with Templar crosses on their chests, they take you back to the time of knights and guide you through the history of the site.

The Commandery of Avalleur is one of the best preserved Templar compounds in northern Europe. The Templars owned land in Avalleur before 1142. A typical example of a rural Occidental Commandery, this small fortified monastery consisted of a chapel, and community and agricultural buildings. Lords of the village, the Templars owned an oven, a mill and many surrounding lands there. In 1312, all property of the Order of the Temple was handed over to Hospitals.

Aware of its undeniable architectural interest, the Aube Departmental Council has fully funded its restoration since 2008. The miraculously intact chapel (early 13th century) is a typical example of the Templar naves in the east of

France, and the central building has been artfully renovated.

The Templars of Avalleur by François Gilet and Valérie Alanièce

To go further and better understand the Templar organization and economy in and around Avalleur, François Gilet and Valérie Alanièce wrote "Templiers d'Avalleur", published in December 2017.

Renowned Aube specialists and members of the Steering Committee for the European Templars Route, the two researchers have managed to anchor the history of the Templars in the Aube.

Hiking in the Forest of the Temple

On this 5km marked circuit of discovery, accessible on foot or mountain bike, the Aube department invites visitors to retrace the history of the Forest of the Temple, the largest forested area in the West that was owned by the Templars. This

historical path gives you insight into the management of this mythical forest, a source of supplies and considerable income for the Templars. It leads visitors to remnants and key places of the Forest of the Temple - like the Bazin Lodge, an old Commandery built by the Templars.



The Templars of the Aube Serious Game

Enter the world of the Knights of the Order of the Temple and lead the quest that will guide you to their treasure!

After you customize your Avatar, Episode 1 takes you back in time, to follow in the footsteps of the Templars in Aube in Champagne. Different scenarios and encounters allow the player to infiltrate the Order of the Temple and be accepted into a Commandery. The main challenge is to leave no trace, create no temporal paradox, and change no course of historical event. Players will thus need to prove their knowledge of the habits and customs of the Middle Ages and make use of various disquises.

The Art Library at the Louis François Center for UNESCO houses more than 100,000 artistic creations from across the world, mainly paintings, created by young people age 3 to 25 from more than 150 countries.

Through artistic workshops and heritage, travelling exhibitions and an international competition of plastic arts and poetry, the Center for UN-

ESCO of Troyes promotes from Aube the values of the International Organization for Education, Science and Culture.

New space dedicated to Jewish history and Rashi

Inaugurated in September 2017, this new visually staged space allows visitors from around the world to better understand the Jewish culture and the major role played by Rashi, a great commentator of the Bible and the Talmud, born in Troyes in the 11th century.

Visitors are welcomed on arrival in an imposing library where works focusing on Jewish culture are organised in different languages. A film then plunges visitors back to the Troyes of Rashi and his Talmudic school. Touchscreen tablets allow visitors to view scrolls of the Torah usually inaccessible outside religious services, to read the comments of Rashi and how things have evolved over time. In a synagogue reconstructed as it might have been in the Middle Ages, and a contemporary synagogue mixing timber frame and glass, the visit is a true journey through time.

There is also a magnificent stained glass win-



dow to discover, which recounts the prosperity and progeny of Rashi of Troyes. This window, which adorns the large community room of the Rashi House, is a creation of the master-glass artist Flavie Vincent-Petit. It covers seven generations of a strong lineage of around fifty people.

Essoyes, Village of Renoir

Opened in June 2017, the House of Renoir in Essoyes enriches your visit further with its interpretive space, workshop, and cemetery, where the painter and some of his family are buried.

This year, the focus will be on the artist and his painter friends, both known and less known, with whom he loved so much to interact. A retrospective on the Renoir Lauréats is also programmed.

Do not miss a visit to one of the "Champagnes of Renoir" partner wineries. Each vintage is associated with a Renoir painting. The generous





and gourmand roundness in the mouth of the Brut Rosé by Champagne Chassenay d'Arce thus recalls "A Young Girl with Daisies". The golden yellow aspect of the Solera Reserve vintage by Champagne R.Dumont & Son evokes the painting " Path Leading through Tall Grass " http://www.aube-champagne.com/fr/les-champagnes-de-renoir/



Camille Claudel Museum in Nogent-sur-Seine

Few people know that the gifted adolescent took her first artistic strides in Nogent-sur-Seine. Born on 24 December 1864 in Aisne, where she spent her early childhood, the young Camille Claudel arrived in Nogent-sur-Seine in 1876, where her father, Louis-Prosper, was appointed registrar of mortgages.

The city honoured her to the fullest by opening the first international museum of Camille Claudel in March 2017. A museum of international importance, the number of works from Claudel

gathered in this architectural space is unsurpassed the world over. The stock is comprised of collections assembled by Reine-Marie Paris and Philippe Cressent, acquired in 2008, and purchases on the art market thanks to the Heritage fund and the generosity of patrons. The forty works on display offer a comprehensive discovery of her artistic career. At the same time, the museum's stock of sculptures helps us understand the artistic context in which Camille Claudel learned, evolved, and developed into an artist. More than 400 works.

To combine culture and gastronomy, a Camille Claudel vintage has been developed with great finesse. Experience it at Champagne François Oudard in Villenauxe-the-Large.





THE AUBE, GRAND SPACES AND WELL-BEING

Forêt d'Orient Regional Natural Park, a place of nature waiting to be explored

A green lung 1½ hours from the capital, Aube en Champagne is an invitation to nature, sports activities, and cultural and responsible discovery. Whether alone, with family, or in a group, a multitude of possibilities are on offer: discovery and preservation of fauna and flora, cultural or heritage visits, sports activities...

Tourists are invited to a change of scenery and return to origins at The Great Lakes of Champagne and the Forêt d'Orient Regional Natural Park. Situated 20 minutes from Troyes, this park is part of a wetland of international importance and, at 82,000 hectares, the largest in France.

The Great Lakes of Champagne are composed of three lakes: Lac d'Orient where 2500 hectares are reserved for sailing and rowing, Lac Amance adapted for the exhilaration of motor boats, and Lac du Temple a paradise of silence, anglers, and nature lovers.

Did you know?

Originally, the first two lakes were created to regulate the courses of the Seine and Aube rivers to prevent major Paris floods. They have blended perfectly into the environment to become areas that are conducive to all kinds of escape.

The territory of preference for ornithologists

The Great Lakes of Champagne, which make up 5000 hectares of the Forêt d'Orient Regional Natural Park, offer migratory species immense aquatic areas for dream stopovers, in addition to essential food resources provided by lakes and exposed mudflats, meadows, ponds and fields.

The creation of large reservoir lakes has undoubtedly greatly strengthened the ornithological interest of this wet sector of the Champagne



region, already conducive to staging of migratory waterfowl.

Thus far more than 265 species of birds have been observed on the lakes and forested lakesides, some of which host prestigious feathered fauna for which the wet Champagne is the only French site for regular overwintering: The White-Tailed Eagle, Bewick's Swan, and the Whooper Swan... The Great Lakes and The Park are also a land of asylum for thousands of cranes on stopover, a few dozen Graylag and Bean Geese, and Black Storks.

From October to November, many ornithological outings are proposed with the aim of observing the migration of cranes.

Nature outing: With the Friends of the Park you can learn where to find amphibians, and about



their preservation and protection. Throughout the year, the Friends of the Park bring the Forêt d'Orient Regional Natural Park alive by proposing numerous outings and events.

The Great Lakes of Champagne, a paradise of silence and anglers

The wet Champagne area includes many diversified aquatic habitats: calm, still waters for pond and lake fish and cool currents for river fish.

Rigorous management of fish fauna has led to exceptional fishing across a rich variety of species, including pike, roach, tench, trout, perch, carp, and perch.

Whether ardent angler or curious beginner, visitors can try night carp fishing, a growing sport which attracting more and more enthusiasts each year.

Visitors will be guided by Thierry Lacombe, passionate fisherman emeritus, who will be happy to reveal his most beautiful discoveries!

Today, a large part of the Lac du Temple is classified as "National Natural Reserve", resulting in space and tranquillity for fishing enthusiasts.

The park also boasts 13 species of amphibian, all of which are protected in France, in addition to 8 species of reptiles.

The Forêt d'Orient Wildlife Area

In the Wildlife Area (Espace Faune) located on a 89 hectare peninsula of the Lac d'Orient you can see mammals of yesterday and today inhabiting the woodlands. With a bit of patience and silence, from the three observatories on the edge of the woods visitors can observe red deer, roe deer and wild boar as well as tarpan, aurochs, European bison and moose. The Wildlife Area enjoys the Tourism & Handicap designation for people with mental, motor, and hearing deficiencies.

Not to be missed: the roar of the stag from late September - early October.

The Dosches Windmill

This traditional building erected using 18th century techniques recalls the 140 windmills that stood proudly in the Aube department at the time, and showcases rare know-how. This superb windmill comes back to life through

Throughout the year, volunteers get together and offer a number of activities to showcase their department.

Discover stained-glass windows

In 2014 the operation "One Day, One Church" (Un Jour, Une Église) was started in collabora-



tion with the Pastorale du Tourisme, the Diocese of Troyes, volunteer organizations, the Aube Departmental Tourism Committee, the Aube Departmental Archives, and the City of Stained Glass (Cité du Vitrail). With its goal the promotion of Aube in Champagne churches, this operation offers visitors a rich program of visits and events during the summer season.

The operation "One Day, One Church" provides an opportunity to appreciate the architectural nuggets of the department, starting especially with the stained glass windows of Vincent-Larcher, a master-glassmaker who left his mark on the religious buildings of the Department.

Aube in Champagne, European Capital of Stained Glass, presents a collection unique in Europe. On this stained-glass trail, more than 200 churches and 9000 m2 of stained-glass offer a complete panorama of the art of stained-glass from the $12^{\rm th}$ to $21^{\rm st}$ centuries, with an exceptional representation of the Beautiful $16^{\rm th}$ century. The Saint-Pierre-and-Saint-Paul cathedral of Troyes alone features 1500 m² of stained glass from the 13th to 19th century.

Visit the timber frame churches

Located in north-east Aube, the trail of the timber frame churches leads visitors down charming country roads punctuated by ponds, forests and prairies. Aube in Champagne counts seven timber frame churches dating from the end of the 15th to the 18th century and testifying to the perfection of half-timber constructions. Come together around local gastronomy

Lovers of cuisine, be it rustic or refined, will adore Aube Gastronomy, both for the quality of its products and for the variety of its specialities. A gustatory getaway led by passionate producers who respect their land and are pleased to share their production secrets.

Prunelle of Troyes

A speciality of the Cellier Saint-Pierre, Prunelle of Troyes is a liqueur prepared from blackthorn berries. Alexandre KRUMENACHER jealously guards the secret of its fabrication, though we know it is based on a marriage with other natural ingredients that give it complexity and a sweet, almondy, gourmand taste.. Distilled since 1840 at the Cellier Saint-Pierre, its recipe was awarded a gold medal at the Universal Exhibition of Paris in 1900.

Riceys AOC Rosé

Our advice for tasting:: Enjoy as a digestif, possibly iced, in "trou champenois", on sherbet or frozen nougat, in cocktails with champagne, or simply as a delicacy...

Which town is home to the largest wine area in all of Champagne? Which is the only Champagne commune with three AOCs?

There is only one answer: The Riceys! In a few numbers: 866 hectares, 288 winegrowers, 35 harvester-producers, and 3 AOCs: Champagne, Coteaux-champenois and Rosé des Riceys.

The rarity of this quiet wine is explained by its manufacturing techniques: produced on only 30 to 35 hectares and only during very sunny years, the Rosé des Riceys keeps for 3 to 10 years. Rosé des Riceys is made from pinot noir grapes. It is a flat rosé that cellars well, with a wild character and aromas of undergrowth and red fruits, which ages very slowly. History cites it as the preferred wine of Louis XIV. The visitors start by meeting the enthusiastic producers happy to share their expertise in a guided tasting...

Cider in the Land of Othe

The apple and the Aube, a history as old as it is intoxicating... it is in the 16th century that we find the first traces of cider activity in the department. More than 300 apple varieties have been listed and saved thanks to "orchard refuges", which a dozen producers are committed to celebrating through cider. In the Land of Othe, the preferred terroir for this brew to which the flint-rich soil gives its famous flinty taste, the production of bottled cider was relaunched at

end of the 1980s. With an inimitable taste, this farm cider, neither pasteurized nor sterilized, is always manufactured in the purest tradition.

AOP Chaource Cheese

La Ferme d'Hotte welcomes visitors to its operation to discover traditional pressing. For four generations this family of cider makers have passionately passed on their production techniques, to the enjoyment of young and old alike.

Chaource is a pretty village located near the headwaters of the Armance, in Bocage country. It is the country of food lovers. It is known far and wide for its cheese made from cows milk, moulded by ladle. Classified AOP, Appellation d'Origine Protégée (Label of Protected Origin), this delicious cheese is recognizable by its thick white rind, soft middle, and inimitable taste.

When gastronomy mingles with discovery...

In the crypt of the Saint-Jean-Baptiste church visitors can find a masterpiece among masterpieces - a scene of statues titled "Mise au Tombeau". Art lovers from around the world come to admire it. Whether believer or not, all seek to unravel the mystery of the talented and anonymous Master of Chaource. The one who transformed stone into emotion.

Handmade AAAAA Andouillette sausages have long been a tradition of Troyes porkbutchers. Louis II, the Duke of Guise, Louis XIV, and Napoleon enjoyed them. Since then, they have spread throughout metropolitan France. Gilbert LEMELLE passionately unveils the secrets of this subtle assembly of pork, cut in thin strips and simmered for hours in a fragrant broth of aromatic herbs.

Where to find them? At Troyes porkbutcher Patrick Maury, elected 2017 Champion of France

for Best Troyes Andouillette by the Commandery of Fins Goustiers of the Duchy of Alençon.

Aube in Champagne, second French producer of sauerkraut

Cabbage is entrenched in the people of Brienne for they have been growing it for a century.

La Choucrouterie Laurent, specialist of this product of the terroir, has produced exceptionally smooth and light sauerkraut since 1906. Lovers of cuisine will adore the recipes of our producers: Sauerkraut with Champagne by Mr Laurent, or Sauerkraut with Cider by Lavines. You can also find it at La Choucrouterie LARI-QUE.

Pascal Caffet Chocolat

Pascal Caffet invites you to share his immoderate taste for high quality pralines. A passion that has guided his creation of a collection of exceptional sweets, the fruit of a craftsmanship worthy of the greatest chocolatiers. A determined and passionate confectioner and chocolate maker, Pascal Caffet won the title of "Best Pastry Craftsman in France," in 1989 and "World Champion of Dessert Professionals" in 1995.

The beauty of products and place. Lovers of chocolate browsing in the recently renovated boutique in Troyes will discover a magnificent burnt-wood ceiling reminiscent of the timber frame buildings of Troyes, and the technique of praline production.

Giving a Champagne Box means giving a 100% authentic gift of Champagne gastronomy, in all its splendour. With crunchy raisin biscuits and Champagne Ratafia from La Petite Biscuiterie, chocolates filled with Champagne nectar from Chocogil, Champagne confit from Délice Décadol, and "Festive Bubbles" flavoured black tea from Herbatica, the "Champagne Box" bears its name wonderfully. A game of cards based on the Templars is also proposed in the box.



Winegrowers of Aube in Champagne, between tradition and sustainable innovation

The Aube gives birth to a rare wine - a golden, sparkling wine whose name is synonymous with festivity: Champagne.

To the south of Troyes, the Côte des Bar forms an arc 30 kilometres wide and 70 km long. This region offers amazing panoramas combining forests, plateaus, rivers, and vine-covered hills beautifully worked by winegrowers to produce Champagne wines. Alongside "Côte des Blancs", "Montagne de Reims" and "Vallée de la Marne", "Côte des Bar" belongs to the major areas which make up the structure of the Champagne vineyards.

There are also two other wine terroirs in the department: Villenauxe-la-Grande to the northwest, which relates to the Sézanne area, and the butte of Montgueux on the doorstep of Troyes, primarily planted with Chardonnay.

For a colourful, cultural journey that will tickle your senses, journey down the 220+ km Champagne Trail! The Aube, land of pinot noir, boasts 45 "Vineyards & Discoveries" designated wine cellars. In picturesque villages, Champagne winegrowers gladly open the door to their cellars.

Revolt of the Winegrowers





To understand the history of Côte des Bar wine growing, one must go back to the beginning of the 20th century and the Revolt of the Winegrowers.

At the beginning of the 20th century, Champagne already had the force of myth that its makers decided to protect. But the Aube, an ancestral land of vineyards, was for a while considered a trivial player.

Aube winegrowers revolted against an administration that refused to award them the Champagne appellation. The law of 22 July 1927 officially granted their Champagne the

precious designation AOC

 Appellation d'Origine Contrôlée (Label of Guaranteed Origin).

From this episode a strong spirit of commitment to its terroir and its quality of hospitality still survives. The know-how of the winegrowers is more evident than ever.

Unesco label

On July 4, 2015 the ultimate in worldwide rec-

ognition was attributed to the winegrowers of Champagne: UNESCO registered the "Champagne Hillsides, Houses and Cellars of Champagne" on its World Heritage List of "Cultural Landscapes".

Where the harvest is still done by hand and where patience is key to producing the King of wines, the men who work the vines understand very well the necessity of adopting a sustainable approach to honour this noble product.

Winegrowers engaged in a sustainable approach

Aube in Champagne can count on numerous winegrowers committed to sustainable development, who share their expertise with passion as they invite visitors to taste different and differing vintages. A few concrete examples of the commitment of our Champagne wineries...

Le Champagne Moutaux has been a Terra Vitis member since 2010 thanks to its integrated viticulture.

Through exploitation of herbicide-free vines since 2015, vines planted with grass in some sectors, maintenance of slopes to respect local species, and an Excellence vintage with 0% pesticides that earned it a certificate by the Wine and Health magazine, this Champagne wine-

Le Domaine La Borderie is also engaged in a responsible approach, since it was the first certified "Viticulture Durable en Champagne" in September 2014. They have a particular interest in respecting ecosystems and in preserving biodiversity and landscapes. Already classified "Haute Valeur Environnementale" since the end of 2013, the domain uses neither herbicide nor insecticide, integrates grass and thins leaves early to limit chemical inputs, limits to the maximum the application of phytosanitary products of chemical origin, replants hedgerows and floral fallow, and installs nesting boxes for birds in the vicinity of the parcels - many initiatives in respect of vines.

Respecting traditions, *Champagne Didier Goussard*, Terra Vitis certified, is engaged in sustainable viticulture as the means of ensuring the production of quality champagne in harmony with the environment. In addition, curious visitors can try their hand at "flying disgorgement". A colourful activity performed in the peaceful garden of the winegrowers.

The Champagne Albert Beerens, certified Terra Vitis, also attaches importance to respect for the environment. Its engagement results in various initiatives in terms of saving energy (insulation of the building and various work areas, lighting by LED only..) and saving water (automatic washing of the press, use of an automatic washer for cleaning the floors and floor coverings...).

At the vineyard level, this Champagne cellar plants grass between vine rows and works the earth under rows to limit erosion, uses weedkillers and anti-botrytis for a rational and integrated protection of vines (40% to 50% reduction in the use of plant protection products) and uses plant protection that is the most respectful for the environment.

The Côte des Bar holds its own with its dynamism and its authenticity

With sparkling events and unusual activities, the Côte des Bar offers the opportunity to discover Champagne differently! By land, air, and water, the treasures of winegrowers are revealed... Our ideas of unusual and authentic activities:

- Enjoy a stunning dinner in a hot-air balloon
- Fly over the vines with a winegrower-pilot
- Go canoeing on the Seine River
- Have a picnic or gourmet meal in the vine-yards
- -Take a stroll or ride a Segway®, horse, or electric bike, through the vineyards
- Cruise in an electric car

Trail of the Côte des Bar Cadoles:

In spite of their thousand-year-old look, these



small dry stone buildings are only 200 years old. Erected hastily by the wine growers of the last century to protect themselves from the harshness of the local climate, they are located exclusively in the region of Courteron, Gyésur-Seine and les Riceys. None look the same and each contain two ton of stones. A loop trail guides hikers through vineyards and plains to discover these historical Champagne igloos. In total, 12 cadoles can be seen on a trail of 7 to 22 km.

Events not to be missed

The Champagne Trail Festival

Over the weekend of 28 and 29 July many winegrowers in the Ource Valley will open their doors. Using a "Flute passport" purchased at the entrance of the village, visitors can taste different vintages and share a festive moment with participating winegrowers.

On Friday 19 October Champagne enthusiasts can take part in the International Day of Champagne! Photo exchanges, notes on tasting, experiences, discoveries, top tips and meetings: on social networks, sharing is the key word for this day.

Become a grape picker for a day

The Tourism & Handicap label in Aube in Champagne

In 2001 the national Tourism & Handicap label of the French State was created to provide reliable, descriptive and objective information regarding the accessibility of tourist sites and facilities, taking into account 4 types of disabilities (hearing, mental, motor and visual) and to develop an adapted tourism offering.

Aube in Champagne works with tourism service providers in the area to develop this label. In total, 10 sites have the "Tourism & Handicap" label, including 3 tourist sites, 4 gîtes, 1 guesthouse, 1 Hotel-restaurant and 1 Hotel.

Experience Champagne a different way

All year long, winegrowers offer visits and beginner tasting workshops:

Macaroons & Champagne Workshop at Champagne Barfontarc

Chocolate - Cheese & Champagne Workshop at Champagne Devaux

Saffron & Champagne Workshop at Champagne Rémy Massin & Son, an oenological activity on the art of tasting bubbles and the discovery of the aromas of Champagne, through agreements developed with a local saffron producer.

A few tourist sites, although not labelled, offer a particular welcome to visitors impacted by these deficiencies. For example hot air balloon basket at the Champagne Air Show is adapted for persons with reduced mobility and the Camille Claudel museum offers tours and activities in sign language for hearing impaired visitors.

The Logis of the Aube, a sustainable and responsible commitment

Each Logis hotel restaurant is different, but all share the same values: personalized hospitality, quality accommodation, regionally inspired dining, and conviviality.

There are 19 establishments in Aube in Champagne distributed across the whole of the Department, all committed to the idea of sustainable development and considered genuinely supportive of rurality in terms of tourism development, employment and apprentice training.

The Logis of the Aube is also committed to respecting the Environment, an indispensable condition specified in the Logis company literature.

In agreement with the destination's commitment to sustainable development, more than 1/3 of the Logis of the Aube, 7 institutions, have started environmental labelling, aiming to communicate quantified information to tourists regarding the key environmental impacts of the establishment.

The institutions undertake to promote local products and short supply chains, notably by proposing local "Sélections du Terroir" menus in collaboration with Aube partners such as Champagne Rémy Massin & Son, certified HVE Level 3, which proposes a vintage with personalised cap and label.

The Logis of the Aube in Champagne includes:



- 19 referenced establishments
- Holidays and fun for all and for all budgets: from 1 to 3 fireplaces for the accommodation and from 1 pot to "Table Distinguée" for the restaurant.
- 7 partner institutions with environmental labelling
- 2 institutions certified Green Key
- 1 establishment with the Tourism& Handicap label

710 partners in the Aube in Champagne Department accept Chèques Vacances including 25 service providers of travel and transport, 87 of culture and recreation, 146 of recreation sports, 248 restaurants, and 226 accommodations, to encourage the arrival of as many visitors as possible.







AUBE, A SUSTAINABLE AND ATTRACTIVE DESTINATION



Under the aegis of the United Nations Environment, Aube is the first department in the Grand Est to be committed to the "Green Passport" initiative. In September 2017 the CDT also joined the network ATD - Acteurs du Tourisme Durable. Within this framework and beyond, many actions have been put in place to promote human-centred tourism based on sustainable innovation.

The Slow tourism Lab, 1st incubator in the world dedicated to rural tourism

In a context of increasing attendance at some tourist sites, tourism is sometimes criticized for its negative effects on the natural or social environment, including mass consumption, waste

production, increased use of means of transport, and tourist zones cut off from their environment.

Conversely, tourism can, particularly in rural areas, lead to positive impacts on behaviour and communities.

Slow tourism and ecotourism, ideas in tune with the times

With a territory 80% rural, a natural heritage, and a great diversity of landscapes, France, and in particular Aube in Champagne, is well-positioned to become a shining light for slow tourism.

Naturally attractive and unifying, the countryside is in high demand by clients on a quest for freedom, authenticity, tasty discoveries and personal encounters. This is an opportunity for France to showcase her rural territories with innovative offers!

Innovation in ecotourism and slow tourism services based on new concepts (innovative accommodation, unusual experiences, quiet strolls...) becomes an opportunity for creators of

tourist businesses, and stakeholders seeking to renew their offer.

That is why the Aube CDT included in its strategy the approach of accompanying tourist businesses and innovative local start-ups to add value, stimulate initiatives, and offer a new way of proposing authentic tourism.

Through the Slow Tourism Lab, Aube in Champagne wishes to put forth five major themes: Silver and Health, Culture and Heritage, Great Outdoors and Nature, Wine Tourism, and the Development, Management and Method of Sustainable Recruitment.

Engaged partners

The structuring of the Slow Tourism Lab builds on the expertise of the Aube CDT and the 9 CDT/ ADT of the Grand Est for Tourism. But it also benefits from the experience of the Technopole

de l'Aube and ESC Troyes for the acceleration and incubation of start-ups.

Launched in September 2017 during the IFTM-Top Résa Salon, the Slow Tourism Lab is thus an open and collaborative network. It responds to the need of structures as expressed by the project

bearers, and takes the form of initiatives for the years 2017/2018: accompaniment in engineering, exchange of good practices, supervision, establishment of a collaborative platform, training workshops, animations, promotional operations, and common communication.

More widely, the network is open to any innovative initiative and to new actors who wish to bring their expertise to accompanied start-ups and young companies.

It responds in particular to the following questions:

Innovative companies, to invigorate respectful tourism

Various start-ups, in the context of the Slow Tourism Lab, have been accompanied in recent months.

Hot! Cold! Ricochet, the sensory stone

This is particularly the case of Ricochet, a project created by two people from the "Etmoietmoietmoi" collective: Martin Le Tiec and Charles Laget.

The principle of the project is to use a connected smart stone that gives hot and cold clues to guide users as they go from point A to point B. The idea is to discover what surrounds us, without referring to a smartphone. When the person arrives at the destination, a description of the place appears on his or her smartphone.

Moodyx, the custom web guide for tourists

Aube in Champagne also accompanied the start-up Moodyx, created in 2017 by Matthieu Samson-Sevestre and Clément Lelarge. Moodyx offers users the ability to pique their curiosity, whether tourist or resident. Through a mobile application, in one minute the user can discover places around them that merit their attention, including places, monuments, activities, recreation, or events. The proposed services are

adapted to the profile of the user through a quick questionnaire submitted at the beginning.

The Templiers de l'Aube, the Serious Game



Aube in 360°

The Centre de Congrès de l'Aube also benefits from the work of an innovative enter-

prise, V.I.R 360, which has put in place a series of 360° videos of the event venue. This new generation of video enriches the experience for clients and prospective clients by allowing them to explore, at a distance and from all angles, different spaces available for their event. A



visit includes viewing by way of a virtual reality headset or a "Cardboard VR" an aerial video that segues into an immersive 360° video, leaving no secrets for prospective clients!

Also available: a 360° video of Avalleur, Brienne-le-Château, and the vineyards of Bar-sur-Aube.

A dynamic business destination

Certified ISO 20121, the Bureau des Congrès de l'Aube has put Responsible Management in place for its events and has established itself as the second convention organizer in the world to receive this certification. The Bureau des Congrès also offers its MICE partners an assessment of their carbon emissions through the company Ecologes.

The Aube in Champagne destination is also among the precursors in the establishment of a system of environmental displays, with a third of hotels labelled.

The Centre de Congrès de l'Aube, a bright idea

At only 1h30 from Paris, the Centre de Congrès de l'Aube opened its doors in 2014, at the initiative of the Department.

Designed as a "tribute to medieval Troyenne architecture", the revisited medieval aspect of the

Centre de Congrès de l'Aube integrates perfectly with the heart of the historic Troyes city centre. It has obtained the distinguished Spanish prize for architecture, Moreno Mansilla.

Flexible and innovative, it welcomes all sorts of professional events, from 100 to 800 partic-

ipants, and enjoys high-tech equipment in an architectural framework combining tradition and modernity.

With its privileged location in the heart of the historic centre of Troyes, visitors benefit from the facilities and conviviality of a city on a human scale: train station, car parks, hotels and restaurants.

Equipped for excellence, it offers the best guarantees for comfort and efficiency: an 800 seat, high-tech equipped auditorium, 1000 m² of modular space, 10 meeting rooms from 18 to 106 seats with integrated sound and video projection, an equipped lobby (reception desks, cloakrooms, dressing rooms, organising

bureau and break spaces), on-site food service facilities for up to 1000 people (with equipped catering kitchen), air conditioning throughout, WIFI equipped, access for people with reduced mobility, privileged access for organizers and technical personnel, same-level unloading, and 12 parking places at the disposal of organisers and VIP guests.

The Centre de Congrès is committed to being responsible by sorting and managing waste, by reclaiming surplus food not consumed during zero-waste events, through the choice of champagne cellars and local producers, through partnerships with local caterers (choice of local and seasonal products, short supply chains, etc.) and through collaboration with the APEI for the food service and entertainment during gala evenings.

The Centre de Congrès de l'Aube also attaches importance to the selection of local providers, in terms of the quality of their services and facilities.

Espace Argence, everybody off!

An old train station converted to an events venue, the Espace Argence is a 6000 m² complex set on 4 hectares in the heart of the historical centre, consisting of a large 1600 m² modular

room and 20 committee rooms including a 100 seat amphitheatre. It can easily host events such as receptions, workshops, seminars, concerts, salons, and meals. Up to 3200 people can be accommodated in cocktail format.

The Cube for very large spaces

With the Centre de Congrès and the Espace Argence, the Cube-Troyes Champagne Expo completes the Troyen triangle. This modern, versatile complex in the heart of the city offers a total surface area of 21,000 m². Its different halls are a motor for exchanges and events from the entire region, its structure is adapted to a very wide range of events, and its performance space can accommodate large-scale events of up to 6500 people.

For more intimate events...

Something novel: Le Cellier aux Champagnes

The cellar of tithes, or cellar of the cathedral, built at the start of the 13th century, was formerly used for the reception of the diocese. Consisting of a room 33 meters long and 10 wide on the second floor, Le Cellier aux Champagnes is an ideal place for hosting events. The room's name was not chosen at random - next to this establishment Prunelle of Champagne, today called Prunelle of Troyes, was created. A place of character filled with history...

Something novel: L'Atypique

L'Atypique features a terrain of 3800 m2 including a 375 m2 reception room overlooking a green space of more than 800m2. An venue sheltered from view and close to Troyes, for successful events. Opening in May 2018

The Camille Claudel Museum

Open since March 2017, the Camille Claudel Museum offers businesses a tailored service which allows events to be organized in one single, outstanding place. A 126 m² room on the 4th floor of the Museum offers a magnificent panoramic view over Nogent-sur-Seine. In addition, the museum offers a private, guided tour of its collections.





Something novel: The Napoleon Museum

The Napoleon Museum, reopened in January 2018, offers businesses a meeting room that can accommodate approximately 50 people. Located in an old chapel, this room full of character and history has all the necessary equipment.

New in September 2018: A new performance space in Troyes

Christian Brendel and Maria Naudin, actors, playwrights, and directors for more than 30 years, and facilitators of a theatre troupe, will open a performance space that can accommodate about 200 spectators on the ground floor and 45 in the balcony. A new room to host cultural and professional events!

Champagne cellars, accommodation facilities, and tourist sites are also places that can host professional events.

The 100% Made in Aube Activity Incentive

The Bureau des Congrès de l'Aube can suggest

many unusual activities in addition to "business" activities where clients can discover this tourist destination.

Whoever says Aube also says Champagne! Many activities are proposed around this famous product of the terroir, including tastings, food & wine pairing, the harvest, winery visits, inductions by the Commanderie du Saulte Bouchon Champenois, Segway promenades, flying above the Côte des Bar with a pilot-winegrower, and canoeing down the river.

For combining culture and fun, Aube and its partners suggest rallies in the heart of Troyes, or promenades on Segways to explore the city's famous "bouchon". Thematic workshops can also be set up throughout the Department such as murder mystery parties, stained-glass or gastronomy workshops, Boot Camps, or outdoor escape games.

The Nigloland amusement park, 40 minutes from Troyes, can be partially or totally privatized, to enjoy an aperitif 60 meters up on the Great

Wheel, or organize a treasure hunt or murder mystery party.

For the companions of convention participants and clients, the Bureau des Congrès suggests exploring its 280 stores and 459 brands, since historically Troyes is the European capital of Designer Outlets, the territory having been strongly impacted by the growth of the textile industry. Between VIP service and discounts, it will be difficult to resist!

Did you know?

Claudie Pierlot, renowned stylist, was born and raised in Troyes. After an international career, she decided to be buried on her natal lands. Her grave can be found in the Troyes cemetery, overlooked by an elegant bronze tree - reflecting her style - created by artist Barbara Soïa.

The Claudie Pierlot boutique opened its doors at the end of 2017 in the McArthurGlen Designer Outlet in Troyes.

Troyes invites visitors to lose themselves in its maze of cobbled alleys lined with timber frame houses. Trimmed in rich colours dating from the end of the Middle Ages and the beginning of the Renaissance, these timber frame houses, remarkable in their state of conservation, are part of the Troyes DNA.

Troyes, the only city in the world with a town centre the shape of a Champagne cork, sur-

prises visitors with its exceptional architectural heritage.

Something novel: The 3x+, unique Café-Théâtre in Champagne

Troyes is also distinguished for its dynamism and its innovative enterprises. This is the case of the establishment "Troyes Fois Plus" (Troyes Times More), open since September 2017, a unique place in Aube in Champagne since it is the only Café-Theatre / Concert venue in the region!

Throughout the year, a varied program of

artists is proposed; One Man, Woman Show, comedies, shows for children, concerts...both up-and-coming and confirmed. A real hub of activity, Troyes Fois Plus promises visitors 3 times more performances, 3 times more concerts, 3 times more ambiance. Host Clément Meunier, elected Troyen of the Year 2017, wants to help new talent in the Grand Est get discovered, a true moment of exchange and discovery!

The bar and cellar spaces are available for privatization for groups of up to 100 people.

Something novel: Le Rucher Créatif , 1st Third Place in Troye ⊺

Le Rucher Créatif in the heart of Troyes is a real Third Place for exchange and creativity, offering a space for meetings and the pooling of resources to accelerate the creation of projects of all kinds. Networking in an ephemeral place punctuated each week by events (exhibitions, concerts, conferences, hackathons, friendly evenings...) is the promise of this space of co-working, exchanges, and mutual assistance.

Nights of Champagne, music in the heart of the city

In existence for more than 30 years, the Nights of Champagne is part of the cultural and musical landscape of Troye. In this new decade, the Nights goes beyond the walls of the usual concert halls (the Cube, Espace Argence, Théâtre de Champagne) and into the bars, with off programming in the streets via a playlist broad-



cast during the week of the festival, or on buses with daily happenings to entertain travellers with music.

When the Festival of the Nights of Champagne turns green. Respect for the environment is one of the indispensable values of the Nights of Champagne. Since 2009, the festival is committed in an eco-responsible approach called "For Sustainable Nights".

The organizers wish, through this approach, to master and reduce the impact of the festival on the territory. It is mainly through a carbon footprint assessment, which allows for accounting of greenhouse gas emissions during the event, that this festival is registered as responsible and conscientious regarding the environment.

Ibis Styles, an accommodation conscious of the Environment

Following the policy of environmental labelling conducted in Aube in Champagne, the Hotel lbis Styles in Troyes is positioned as the service provider with the best note at the national level. A recognition granted to this provider of tourist accommodation which gives paramount importance to its environmental impact.

This restaurant pleasantly surprises with the originality of its atypical decoration, a subtle and harmonious mixture of several styles resulting in a warm, baroque ambiance. A bistrot cuisine developed from fresh, seasonal, carefully selected, quality produce.

Aube, land of cinema

Due to its proximity to the capital, Aube in Champagne is positioned as a favourite place for European co-productions considering filming, animation or post-production.

Through its history and heritage, the department has many places of industrial and historical memory that can serve as true film sets.

Aware of the importance of developing hospitality for filming in the department, stakehold-

ers and professionals reserve a special welcome to production teams by offering quality services (hotels,guesthouses, gites, food service,...).

Many personalities have thus been charmed by this innovative, sparkling territory. Director Victor Saint Macary notably shot a few scenes for his film "Ami-Ami" in Troyes during the Foires de Mars. Antoine Blossier transformed the Vauluisant district for his film "Sans Famille" and Claude Lelouch sponsored filmmakers Daniel Blaudez and Sandrine Montagud for their film

"l'Histoire de Jean", shot around the lakes of the Forêt d'Orient and the Moulin de Dosches.

European Templars Route

Aube in Champagne, the cradle of the Order of the Temple, is replete with historic sites highlighted by the Templars Route. It was in 2012, on the occasion of the International Symposium of the the-

matic year "Templars". A history, our treasure", that the idea of the Templars Route was born. In 2016, following the connecting of Aube in Champagne with the city of Tomar, these two communities founded the association Templars Route European Federation and engaged in the creation of a European Cultural Route. Since then, the cities of Perugia in Italy and Ponferrada in Spain have joined this common project of highlighting and promoting the Templar Heritage.

Having as its objective the development of cultural activities and events, and scientific and cultural exchanges between universities, cul-

tural institutions and history associations - mainly through tourist, school, and university exchanges - the Templars Route meets the three pillars of sustainable development. By encouraging sustainable and responsible cultural tourism, by increasing the attractiveness of destinations and the attendance of historical

sites, and by promoting exchanges between the different members of the project, the Templars Route is a real tool for the development of Aube in Champagne.

The Napoleon Museum and the city of Brienne-le-Chateau have, for their part, adopted the "Destination Napoleon" European Cultural Route. Remember that the emperor who fought his first battles at the Military School of Brienne maintained a strong attachment to the Champagne area throughout his life.

In the footsteps of the Templars in the Aube:

- The Commandery of Avalleur is one of the best preserved Templar compounds in northern Europe.
- The Hugues de Payns Museum, which traces the route of the first Grand Master and Founder of the Order of the
- The Cathedral of Troyes, where the first religious and military order of Christianity was formalized.
- The Abbey of Clairvaux, and Saint Bernard, great Cistercian figure who brought an unfailing support to the Templars.
- The Forest of the Temple and its marked route revealing the secrets of the history and presence of the Templars.

Other "Routes" in Aube in Champagne

Aube in Champagne, through its international outreach and history, has many "routes", a sign of pilgrimage or return to origins for many tourists, foreign or French.

The department is indeed crossed by several important Roman paths, such as the Via Agrippa, which linked Italy to Boulogne-sur-Mer and Trier. This track splits into two routes at Châlonssur-Saône. The first goes to Châlons-en-Champagne by way of Troyes, the other by way of Langres and Bar-Sur-Aube. Other secondary routes exist that were maintained in the Middle Ages: the route from Troyes to Beauvais by way of Meaux, from Troyes to Sens, and from Troyes to Avallon by way of Chaource.

The Champagne Fairs

From the 5th century the existence of a fair in Troyes has been mentioned. In fact, the gallo-roman city of Augustobona (the name of Troyes at the time) was a stopover for many European travellers since it is located on the Via Agrippa and near the Seine. It was in the Middle Ages that

the Counts of Champagne recognized the Troyes Fair, as well as the Champagne Fairs. Gatherings of people from throughout the West, one could find Flemish, English, and Spanish wool, silks, hides, furs, spices, precious wood, and jewellery. The Champagne Fairs have participated in the economic growth

of the region and the prosperity of the territory.

The Cistercian Abbeys Route

In 1098 Robert of Molesme founded the Abbey of Cîteaux and thus gave birth to the Cistercian Order.



The European Charter of Cistercian Abbeys and sites counts more than 200 sites open to the public throughout 11 European countries (from Portugal to Poland and Italy to Sweden) and managed by local and national administrations, individuals and cultural associations.

In Aube in Champagne, tourists in search of exceptional heritage discoveries can go to the Cistercian Abbey of Clairvaux, founded in the twelfth century by Saint-Bernard and masterpiece of French of the monastic architecture.

The Quebecers Route

Champagne-Ardenne has borne famous founders of "New France". Initiatives are thus multiplied in order to recall the important contribution of this region to the growth of French influence in North America in the 17th and 18th centuries. For this, the Federation of North

American Friends of Champagne-Ardenne (NAVA) was created in 1999. This federation brings together 8 associations from 4 regional departments (the Ardennes, Marne, Aube, and Haute-Marne).

In Aube in Champagne you can find four founders: Marguerite Bourgeoys in Troyes, Paul Chomedey de Maisonneuve in Neuville-survalve, Jessé Fléché in Lantages and Claude de Ramezay in Lagesse.

The Thibaud de Champagne Route

The Thibaud de Champagne route goes across regions, between Vincennes and Troyes, that were formerly shared between the royal domain and the county of Champagne. It takes its name from the five Thibaud who have been Counts of Champagne. This route allows visitors to discover castles and churches East of Paris.



passing through Provins on the way to Troyes. It is therefore possible to visit all kinds of castles, in particular the Motte-Tilly château in Aube.

The Grandes Randonnées trails

In Aube in Champagne, three main GR trails are offered to tourists, along which they can explore tourist or natural sites and meet members of the local population.

The Via Francigena

The Via Francigena is a route borrowed from the Middle Ages by pilgrims coming from the Kingdom of the Francs on the way to Rome, the seat of Christianity in the West. They used in large part the network of Roman paths of the time. Since 2004, the Via Francigena is recognized as a Major Cultural Route by the Council of Europe



and has been labelled a Grande Randonée trail. This historic route allows visitors to discover the cultural and architectural heritage of the Aube, especially as it passes through the Forêt d'Orient, the Cistercian abbey of Clairvaux, and the city of Bar-sur-Aube, nestled among the vinevards of the Côte des Bar.

The Joan of Arc historical trail

Linking Poissons (Haute-Marne) to Cunfin (Aube), the 130 km long Joan of Arc historical trail is a real return to history. Hikers will discover in the vicinity of this trail the famous Abbey of Clairvaux, a high-place of religious history and a site impregnated with Cistercian spirituality.

The champagne cellars and their passionate winegrowers will make visitors want to stop awhile to absorb the soothing wine landscapes. In the vicinity of the circuit the Musée du Cristal de Bayel can also be found, located next to the old Cristallerie Royale of Champagne, one of the oldest French manufacturers of mouthblown crystal. Workshops for young and old are proposed.

Saint James of Compostela

Three main paths are present in Aube in Champagne; one going to Bar-on-Aube, another passing through Troyes coming from Reims, and a third passing to the west of the Department by Villenauxe-la-Grande and the Othe forest.

Other "Trails of Compostela" existed in the Aube, though today they are no longer really conducive to travelling entirely on foot: motorways, highways, and crops have of course greatly changed the network of tracks and paths of the Middle Age.
